AgriLife Extension personnel have the expertise to provide programs in the areas of:


- Supporting production agriculture

In addition to providing educational tools and programs, our agency administers services such as soil analysis, water testing, pest identification, plant disease diagnosis and wildlife damage management.


We also offer technical certification and training, teaching thousands of people each year who provide essential services and positive economic results.






WORKFORCE

The total workforce of 1,812 fulltime equivalent positions is made up of 1,454 positions budgeted by the agency and 360 county-funded personnel who work in the county Extension offices. The agency's cost for administration and shared administrative services is only 3.5% of its total budgeted expense.

Available funding budget FY22 (\$160M)




State Appropriations (\$68M)
